- The environmental links to breast cancer risk and steps to reduce and/or avoid these risks.

Workshops #1 - #5 will cover information on:

- Toxic Environmental Exposures in Consumer Products
- Steps for Success in Policy Reform
- How to Communicate About Breast Cancer and the Environment to Diverse Lay Audiences

Workshop #6 will be a working session to develop a 45 minute presentation for a community audience/group using no more than 40-50 slides.
