### **Are We Making Progress?**

#### <u>Incidence</u>

Estimated chance that a woman in the U.S develops invasive breast cancer (NCI)

1975- 9.09% 2016- 12.4%

**2017**- 255,120 new invasive cases in US **63,410** new in situ cases in US (ACS, 2017)

#### **Mortality**

2017- More than 1,400 women will die each day(ACS)

2017- More than 522,000 will die worldwide (GloboCan, 2012)

2016- 3,560,570 women alive in the US with a history of breast cancer(ACS 2016/2017)

- Betty Ford (1974) public announcement because of Watergate
- Happy Rockefeller (1975) VP's wife
- Nancy Regan (1987) chose a mastectomy even though lumpectomy plus radiation (when appropriate) showed equal survival

# Breast Cancer Organizations founded by advocates

ASC founded in 1913 by physicians was the only established cancer organization

- 1978-Y-ME- Ann Marcou (d.), Mimi Kaplan (d.) began as a hotline operated out of Marcou's Chicago-area home and a support group that met at a local YWCA
- 1978- SHARE- breast and ovarian cancer support programs
- 1982- Komen- Nancy Brinker, dedicated to her sister Susan Goodman Komen who died of her disease at 36, focus on awareness and early detection- has developed into education, advocacy and research. Komen Tissue Bank in Indiana- asking well women to donate tissue for research.
- 1990- NABCO- Amy Langer, Rose Kushner (d.) alliance of organizations focusing on support, education and developed into political action-no longer in operation
- 1990- (Breast Cancer Fund) Breast Cancer Prevention Partners- Andrea Martin (d.) science based advocacy organization that works to prevent breast cancer by eliminating exposure to toxic chemicals and radiation
- 1990-Breast Cancer Action- Eleanore Pred (d), Susan Claymon (d.), Barbara Brenner (d.) to achieve health justice for all women at risk of and living with breast cancer.
- 1990-CABCO- Coalition of Breast Cancer Organizations in CA focusing on breast cancer public policy issues
- 1990-Helen Mautner Project- Susan Hester-envisions a health care system that is respectful of and accessible to all without regard for their sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.



# Breast Cancer Organizations founded by advocates (continued)

- 1991- National Breast Cancer Coalition- Fran Visco- focus on public policy and advocacy, is governed by a grassroots Board of Directors who represent organizations that reflect the diversity of breast cancer.
- **1991- Living Beyond Breast Cancer- Marissa Weiss-** To connect people with trusted breast cancer information and a community of support.
- 1991-Women of Color Breast Cancer Survivors Support Project- PJ Viviensayles (d.), Beverly Rhines (d.) provided emotional support and crisis intervention for women of color breast cancer survivors and their significant others; education and public policy.
- 1993- Silent Spring- founded by MA Breast Cancer Coalition-study links between the environment and women's health, starting with breast cancer.
- **1994-Sisters Network, Inc.- Karen Jackson** leading voice and only national African American breast cancer support organization in the US.
- 1996-Nueva Vida- Carolina Hinestrosa (d.), educate, support Latino families and to advocate and facilitate the timely access to state of the art cancer care
- 1996-Zero Breast Cancer (Marin Breast Cancer Watch) promotes breast cancer risk reduction through translation of scientific research and evidence-based recommendations that support health and wellness at key stages of life.
- 1998- Young Survival Coalition- Roberta Levy Schwartz, Lanita Moss, Joy Simha- is the premier organization dedicated to the critical issues unique to young women who are diagnosed with breast cancer

# Legislation and Science Working Together

#### The Year is 1992/93

#### Dept. of Defense Breast Cancer Research Program

- In response to the lobbying efforts of the breast cancer advocates, Congress authorized funds in support of new and promising research
- Vision: To end breast cancer by funding innovative, highimpact research through a partnership of scientists and consumers (advocates)
- \$3.28 billion (FY92-FY16)of new federal dollars for breast cancer research
- Due to the success and transparency, today there are 28
   Congressionally Directed Research Programs



# CA. Breast Cancer Act of 1993 Meanwhile in California

- Advocates collaborated with Assemblywoman Barbara Friedman
- 2 cents tax on cigarettes
- Created
  - California Breast Cancer Research Program,
  - Breast Cancer Early Detection Program (Every Woman Counts)
  - provided funding for the California Cancer Registry that funded the
    - California Teacher's Study, a prospective study of 133,000 teachers or administrators that continues today.



## California Breast Cancer Research Program (CBCRP)

- Established under the Breast Cancer Act of 1993.
- Advocates comprise 1/3 of the Advisory Council.
- Advocates participate in peer-review as well as programmatic review.
- Scientists are required to include advocates on all grant proposals.
  - Includes active participation of advocate in all aspects of the grant.
  - Educates researchers about who and what is an advocate.



## California Teacher's Study

- Prospective cohort study of 133,000 California teachers and administrators since 1995.
- Consortium of investigators from CA DHS, City of Hope, Cancer Prevention Institute of CA, UC Irvine & USC.
- Includes advocates on the Scientific Task Force.
- Includes advocates on the Steering Committee,





#### What is a Research Advocate?

- Research advocates put a "human face" to the science.
- Research advocates are well trained and educated in the science of breast cancer.
- Research advocates need to be involved in every aspect of research as well as decision-making.



#### **Educate to Advocate**

#### **NBCC Project Lead**

- Since 1995 has educated more than 2,000 breast cancer advocates on the science of breast cancer
- Project Lead Workshops, Clinical Trials Project Lead,

  - Komen Advocates in Science



#### **Federal and State Action**

#### Federal legislation

- 1996-2000 Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment Act passes Congress and ratified by every state
- 2008 Breast Cancer and the Environmental Research Act
- 2010-2017+ Affordable Care Act

#### California legislation

- 2001 Patient Care Cost in Clinical Trials Act
- 2008 Biomonitoring Act
- 2012 Breast Density Notification Act



# Breast Cancer and the Environment

#### The Year is 2008

- Passage of the Breast Cancer and the Environmental Research Act
- Report of the Interagency Breast Cancer and the Environment Research Coordinating Committee (2013)
- BCERP research
  - Effects of Endocrine Disruptors
